

Paul Evans Thursday 12th March

Dunkirk: Defeat, Debacle, Decision or Defiance?

Paul is a project historian and was the BBC's artillery expert for their roadshow commemorating the First World War. He was also the lead speaker in a recent U3A Thames Valley Network Study Day on Dunkirk. In this talk, he will look at the overall importance of Dunkirk in the conduct of WW2, the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force and how this was achieved.

Karen is Chief Executive of the David Shepherd Wildlife Foundation, now in its 35th year. The Foundation is involved in several projects, including investigation of wildlife crime, reducing tiger poaching, snow leopard conservation and much more.

The Grandeur of King George

On January 20th a group of U3A members braved the cold and showers to visit the 'Queens Gallery', Buckingham Palace, to view the exhibition: *George IV: Art and Spectacle*. The Group met outside the gallery with Jackie Cobb, who had ably organised the visit. We then entered to hear a lecture given by one of the curators, Catherine Jones. This gave us a fascinating introduction to George IV as an art collector. After a cup of what some of us considered aristocratically weak tea, we continued into the gallery to view the exhibits.

These included sumptuous paintings from artists such as Joshua Reynolds and Sir Thomas Lawrence, plus other artefacts, furniture and ceramics. Interestingly, George also collected the work of a number of lesser-known artists. Many of their paintings depicted the very plain studios and hard life of the artists, carpenters and ceramicists who created the artefacts and images which graced the ornate world inhabited by the wealthy two hundred years ago. The gilded galleries provided plenty to consider as we braved the cold, showery streets back to Victoria station.

Art reflecting life

I have always liked black and white films, not least as a form of social history and of scenes of the recent but distant past. Of local interest, Margaret Rutherford starred as a magnificent but miscast Miss Marple in a monochrome and deserted old Amersham in *Murder at the Gallop* in 1963. And thirteen years earlier in *The Blue Lamp* there were similar scenes of utter desolation, this time with a car chase (with a reassuring police bell as opposed to a nerve wrenching siren), through the empty streets of St Johns Wood where you could park a production line of cars with ease. In the same film and in all films at that time, males over the age of six months are all wearing trilbies or flat caps and smoking selflessly in order to create a genuine much loved London smog and the first NHS queues.

Much more recently, I was watching one of Clive James's *TV Postcard* series, this one of London, filmed in 1991 and therefore in colour, when one scene caught my eye. It was a group of feckless youth (aren't they all, and weren't we? And by the way, what is a feck?) lounging around in Piccadilly Circus. They all looked oddly still, unengaged, disinterested, bored and frankly idle (aren't they all...), but more so. Something was missing. It was not the ripped jeans uniform of which Frank Skinner comments "why do people try to look poor?" No, it was the absence of the mobile phone. Now the mobile phone has its critics, but the same picture today would be one of animation, engagement and interest as well as communication. And it was a reminder of how much society has changed and, dare one say, improved in the last 30 odd years.

In November we studied Japanese art after one of our convenors visited Japan. At Christmas we painted our own collective version of well-known paintings. These are displayed at The White Hill Centre. Recently we did pictures of Venice. Most of this group have been together for almost six years now. We have no vacancies at present.

Art Discussion 1 Angela Bishop



Our Group chose to meet in December at 'Zaza' in Amersham for an Italian festive meal. In January we met to discuss the Bauhaus. Last year was the centenary of this movement, which started in Germany. One member introduced us to the principles of the movement; simplicity, form and function. It was launched by a group of architects, designers and artists. It had a stormy history, particularly during the Nazi regime, but its influence can be seen even today in architecture and design.

In February we met to see and discuss 'Childhood'. It was suggested that the first images of a child were portrayed in those of the Madonna and child, during the 15th century. Children were only portrayed as children in the 17th century, as seen in the works of Anthony Van Dyck, who painted several portraits of the children of Charles I. The group felt that the portrayal of children blossomed under the Impressionists as demonstrated in 'The Cradle' by Berthe Morisot; a haunting image of a mother looking anxiously over her baby. Finally one member reminded us of 20th century street photography of children captured by Roger Mayne. The black and white images proved nostalgic for our aged group.

Future subjects to be discussed are The Golden Age of Islam, Hundertwasser and Cartoons. Our Group is full at present.

We have a year of varied and fascinating lectures and discussions ahead of us, with our new programme agreed in December. With all our members happy to speak at meetings, we had the pleasure of numerous ideas to choose from and members can pick whether they want to do a whole talk themselves, prepare a half-meeting-length talk, or contribute to a general theme. Our December meeting was also a sociable affair (lots to eat!) and a chance to share pictures related to Christmas or winter from around the world.

In January Caroline gave a talk on the Scottish Colourists, inspired by a recent trip to an exhibition of their work at 'The Lightbox', Woking. Contemporaries of painters in France such as Matisse and Derain, these four Scottish artists of the early 20th century produced wonderfully vibrant paintings, mainly portraits, landscapes and particularly colourful and attractive still-lives. Their work now fetches very high prices, but they are possibly still not as well-known as the 'Glasgow Boys' group who preceded them; their pictures were new to many in our group and they definitely gained new admirers.

Gill gave a delightful presentation in February called *A Year in Art*, having chosen a painting to reflect each month of the year. Some were specific to a month, such as *Quatorze Juillet à Paris* by Gustave Loiseau (1925) and *The Burning of the Houses of Lords and Commons, October 16th, 1834* by Turner. Others

captured the flavour of the month by its weather or traditions, such as *Winter Landscape with Elegant Skaters* by Adam van Breen (1611) for January and *The Tennis Party* by Sir John Lavery (1885) for June. We much enjoyed the wide variety of styles and periods that Gill had selected.



Our February meeting saw the first of our Group Member presentations: Christine Ogborne gave a very informative and sensitive talk on her visit to Krakow. Spared much of the bombing, it is beautiful city of medieval buildings, churches and synagogues dating from the 16th century. Schindler's factory, now a museum, brings its history right up to date. We then moved onto Carew Road where we saw the impressive house where Peter used to live. This apparently was strategically placed opposite St Helens boarding school for girls enabling him, as a teenager, to wave to the schoolgirls opposite from his bedroom window. He assured us that they waved back. Finally, most of us returned to our start point and an excellent Italian restaurant for lunch. It was unanimously agreed that we had all enjoyed an excellent day.

The Lure of the Underground

Our walk commenced at Baker Street Tube Station where, in 1863, the Metropolitan Line became the first underground railway line in the world. Credited with being the most prominent and successful promoter was one Charles Pearson; a prominent London solicitor, campaigner and social reformer.

Concerned by the severe congestion throughout London following the success of the overland train system and Marc Brunel's success with his tunnel underneath the Thames, Pearson convinced enough businessmen to finance this first venture. Steam driven at this time, the line was a great success, prompting others to follow. The rest as we say, is history.

From Baker Street we travelled the short distance to Kings Cross, scene of an horrific fire in 1987. Caused by a lit match falling underneath the wooden escalator it soon became an inferno resulting in the loss of 41 lives. On a positive note, safety procedures were extensively reviewed, improved and wooden escalators eliminated. On a lighter note; from there we travelled to Covent Garden, one of the many stations designed by Leslie Green and his distinctive design has lost none of its attraction. From there, it was a short walk to Leicester Square and yet another Leslie Green masterpiece. Our final stop was Westminster; although not strictly the newest of tube stations, the deep tunnelling underneath the station to facilitate the Jubilee line and the resultant reconstruction of the station itself, could just about qualify the station as the latest construction. Mention must also be made of Harry Beck, a draughtsman who was commissioned in 1913 to design a map of the tube network. This he did, and although many attempts have been made to improve his design, it has stood the test of time.
